A PRETTY GOOD MIRACLE

Many of us have wonderful childhood memories of Christmas. For some of us, it was the wonderful Midnight Communion of Christmas Eve. when we visited our candle-lit country church nestled among snowy fields, under a starlit sky.

Special memories of Christmas can move us to tears. Perhaps it is when certain carols are sung, or tables are laden for meals. Faces glowing by candlelight during "Silent Night" is hard to beat. Christmas is indeed full of wonderful emotions, yet there is so much more to this special day. For the warm emotions are built on rock - solid truths that will stand for ever. For the events were historic, and the miracles really happened.

To the normal, logical, rational, 21st century mind it is all bizarre. An angel came to a girl who was not even married telling her she was going to have a baby. To cap it all, the "father" was not her boy-friend but the Holy Spirit. The girl - Mary - not only bought the story but then told her cousin Elizabeth who was promptly filled with the Holy Spirit. She then told Mary she was unbelievably blessed. Mary then sang an amazing song that people have been singing ever since.

It gets more crazy and complicated because Elizabeth's husband had had an extraordinary meeting with an angel and been struck dumb ever since. it was only when the baby was born and he

wrote down: "His name is John" that he got his voice back. He started praising God.

The miracles heap up with the birth of Mary's child. Shepherds in a field saw the sky full of angels who told them to go and see a baby in nearby Bethlehem. They believed it was God telling them to go. They came back praising God. Others went too, some of them poor, others very rich - but they all came away praising God and wanting to tell others.

These were supernatural stories of people meeting Jesus and believing in Him. Their lives were radically changed. Amazingly, Jesus continues to do the same today. In John 1:12 we read that for those who did receive Him and believe in Him "He gave them the right to become God's Children"

Let's all of us make this Christmas a chance to receive Him and believe in Him, that in itself is a pretty good miracle.

At the moment we have actually had active input from over one hundred and ten individuals. We have access to various artefacts, pictures as we find the need from within the community, with lots of different pictures etc already scanned to be used. Being a multi media exhibition we are really lucky to have many really interesting sound bites. The most exciting for me has been the spontaneous singing by a women's group of a May Day song from their childhood in the 40's. This will be juxtaposed with a group of teenager boys who have developed a rap expressing how it feels to live here in Poole today. We've already got 10 groups who are willing to host the exhibition once it is ready. In case you've forgotten **Living Histories** is a multi media project with various strands, its overarching aim is:

To celebrate Poole and its diversity by exploring Poole's Past, Present and Future as experienced by you, those who live, work, play or visit Poole.

This strand is a multi media exhibition of ordinary people's memories, thoughts and ideas related to Poole and its development and includes pictures and memorabilia that people have shared with us through that story telling. If you would like to

One of the aims of Bridging Communities is to empower, support and enable people's voices to be heard, the Living Histories project is one way we have tried to achieved that, another is the Shout Out. St Nicholas

Father Christmas seems to be as old as Europe. Once he was Woden, lashing his reindeer through the darkness of northern midwinter. Then he encountered the church, and She transformed him into a saint, the much loved Nicholas, Bishop of Myra(in south west Turkey) in the fourth century. St Nicholas became the patron saint of children, and was given 6 December as his day.

Since the 6th century St Nicholas has been venerated in both East and West, though virtually nothing is known of his life. Some believe he may have been one of the fathers at the Council of Nicea (325) imprisoned during the Emperor Diocletian's persecution.

According to legend, Nicholas was an extremely generous man. He revived three schoolboys murdered by an innkeeper in a tub of pickles. He rescued three young women from prostitution by giving their poverty-stricken father three bags of gold. (Hence the use of three gold balls as the pawnbroker's signs.

Over the centuries many, including children, sailors, unmarried girls, pawnbrokers and moneylenders have claimed him as their patron.

Perhaps it was on account of St Nicholas' generosity that in recent centuries children began to write little notes sometime before 6 December, to tell him about the toys they specially wanted. These notes were then left on the windowsill at night - or else on a ledge in the chimney.

But St Nicholas day chanced to lie in the magnetic field of a much more potent festival and after a while his activities were moved towards Christmas. Then in Bavaria the children still left their notes on the windowsill, but they addressed them to Liebes Christkind - Krishinkle as they know him - and the saint's part in the matter was simply to deliver the letters in heaven.

The most popular result of the cult of St Nicholas has been the institution of Santa Claus. He is based on Nicholas' patronage of children and the custom in the Low Countries of giving presents on his feast. Santa Claus has reached his zenith in America, where the Dutch Protestants of New Amsterdam (New York) united to it Nordic folklore legends of a magician who both punished naughty children and rewarded good ones with presents.
